Chief Adviser hopes to make Dhaka City more habitable

Chief Adviser Dr. Fakhruddin Ahmed hoped for making the city of Dhaka more habitable by chalking out an integrated planning through concerted efforts and ideas of all concerned including the Rajuk, the City Corporation, urban planners, designers and environmentalists of public and private sectors, the social elites and the stakeholders. He was speaking as the chief guest at the inaugural ceremony of the LGED constructed Banani-Gulshan connecting bridge over Gulshan Lake in the metropolis on 7 December 2008.

Chaired by Mr. Shaikh Khurshid Alam, Secretary, Local Government Division, the ceremony was also attended by, among others, Mr. Md. Anwarul Iqbal, Adviser for LGRD and Cooperatives as the special guest.

Speaking as the chief guest Dr. Fakhruddin Ahmed said, "Combination of the 15-year Strategic Transport Plan (STP) and Detailed Area Plan (DAP) for Dhaka Metropolitan Development Plan (DMDP) would make the capital city modern and more livable." He said, the Banani-Gulshan Connecting Bridge would address the existing communication hazards and insurmountable traffic jams at the more significant areas of Banani, Gulshan, Baridhara and Badda in the city. He said,

the government planned to construct bridges over Gulshan Lake at different points to minimize the tormenting traffic pressure at the said areas. He further said, the construction of Banani-Gulshan Connecting Bridge was a part of that planning. The new bridge initiated by the Ministry of LGRD & Cooperatives, is expected to greatly lessen the heavy traffic pressure on existing Mohakhali and Kamal Ataturk Avenue connecting roads.

Earlier, the Chief Adviser unveiled a plaque on the 306-meter long bridge which began from the earlier dead-end of Road No.11 of Banani and gave an alternate access to Gulshan across the lake. The bridge, costing Tk.22 crore and funded by the Government of Bangladesh, connects Road No.11 of Banani with Road Nos. 41, 43, 35 and 34 of Gulshan. The construction of the bridge was completed about 6 months ahead of the targeted 18 months.

Adviser Mr. Md. Anwarul Iqbal and Local Government Division Secretary, Mr. Shaikh Khurshid Alam also spoke on the occasion. Mr. Md. Nurul Islam, Chief Engineer, LGED delivered a vote of thanks. Advisers, Special Assistants to the Chief Adviser and senior government officials were present at the inaugural gathering.

Editor's Note

LGED to build more cyclone shelters

November 15, 2007 was a black Thursday! A hurricane grade cyclone named 'Sidr' struck coastal Bangladesh with devastating impact. Over two million people including thousands of fishermen and farmers lost their valuable possessions. They became destitute overnight. It is claimed however that fewer died this time around compared to that of 1970 and 1991 because of early warning and timely evacuation. An estimated 10 million people live in Bangladesh's coastal areas. Most ordinary houses in rural areas are made of thatch, wood and tin which seem to be vulnerable to Nature's fury.

Over the last two decades, Bangladesh has embarked on a comprehensive programme to build more cyclone shelters. LGED has been constructing cyclone shelters and earthen fortresses in the coastal regions over the years. LGED's Cyclone Shelter Project, funded by IFAD, was designed to help the cyclone hit rural families. Under the project, 40 cyclone shelters had been constructed in Kutubdia, Chokoria, Anwara and Banshkhali upazila. One earthen fortress (killa) for each cyclone shelter had also been created to protect the cattleheads, pets and domestic goods.

After the devastating cyclone of 1991, the Government of Japan granted assistance to construct 40 multi-purpose cyclone shelters. Later, during the second phase of the project 41 cyclone shelters were constructed. Besides, 82.50 km connecting roads were constructed under the project.

LGED has constructed 198 cyclone shelters with assistance from ADB, 108 cyclone shelters from GTZ funding, 81 cyclone shelters with JICA assistance, 195 Union Parishad Complex-cum-cyclone shelters with GOB fund and 25 cyclone shelters from IDA-IFAD fund. LGED has constructed till date 607 cyclone shelters.

In near future, LGED is committed to construct 36 more cyclone shelters with JICA Grant and 50 more cyclone shelters to be funded by World Bank. Besides, 350 old cyclone shelters would be taken up for maintenance.

LGED believes in theory and practice of building better infrastructure – roads, bridges, shelters, embankments, communications and transportation – using appropriate technology and locally produced materials. LGED is committed to ensure the safety and security of the people in the coastal regions through building more and more cyclone shelters.

Denmark Govt. keen to rebuild Sidr-affected infrastructure

His Excellency Mr. Einar Hebogard Jensen, the Honorable Ambassador of Denmark in Bangladesh laid the foundation stone of Bangladesh-Denmark Friendship Bridge at Kalapara in Patuakhali district on 1 December 2008. The bridge would be constructed by LGED as part of Danish support to rehabilitate roads and bridges damaged by the devastating cyclone Sidr in November 2007. It may be mentioned here that 8 more large bridges in Patuakhali and Barguna districts are under construction under Sidr programme of the Govt. of Denmark. These bridges will be constructed by RRMAIDP of LGED.

Speaking on the occasion as chief guest, the Danish Ambassador said, immediately after last year's cyclone Sidr, the Embassy of Denmark together with development partners assessed the damages in a bid to provide support through the sector programmes in agriculture and rural roads as well as water sanitation for helping the Sidr affected people in Bangladesh. He said Bangladesh-Denmark Friendship Bridge would be one of the biggest bridges (around 100 m) under the Sidr rehabilitation programme.

Chaired by Mr. Md. Nurul Islam, Chief Engineer, LGED the foundation laying ceremony of Bangladesh-Denmark Friendship Bridge at Kalapara was also attended by, among others, Mr. Reaz Ahmed, Deputy Commissioner, Patuakhali, Mr. Harun-ur-Rashid, Senior Programme Officer, Danish Embassy, Dhaka and Mr. Humayun Sikdar, Chairman, Kalapara Pourashava.

In his address as chairperson Mr. Md. Nurul Islam, Chief Engineer, LGED said, Denmark is a good friend of Bangladesh since long. He said, immediately after the severe devastation caused by the cyclone 'Sidr' in November 2007, DANIDA has been extending support to

the helpless people of the affected areas and declared to assist rebuilding the damaged infrastructure to restore the connectivity.

Earlier, in an address of welcome, Mr. Md. Matiar Rahman, Project Director, RRMAIDP, LGED said, in consideration of the plight of the SIDR-hit people of Patuakhali district the Government of Denmark took a prompt action to construct the 100-meter long RCC bridge at Kalapara. He said, the bridge would help improve the socio-economic condition of the people of 6 unions under Patuakhali and Barguna districts.

Joint ADB/KfW/GTZ Review Mission visited LGED's RIIP-1: A four member Joint Review Mission from ADB, KfW and GTZ carried out a comprehensive review of

the Rural Infrastructure Improvement Project (RIIP-I) covering eight districts in Khulna and Barisal divisions from 20 November to 30 November 2008. Headed by Mr. Rafiqul Islam, ADB Project Implementation officer, the other members of the Mission were Ms. Ferdousi Sultana, Social Development and Gender Officer of ADB, Mr. Christoph Isenmann, KfW Regional Director and Ms. Stefanie Halfmann GTZ, Implementation officer.

The Mission inspected the ongoing and completed road improvement and bridge construction works, performance-based maintenance schemes, district mobile maintenance teams, UP complexes and tree plantation/nursing procedures. The Mission also visited several Union Councils being strengthened under the RIIP-1 as well as growth centres (including women market sections) and boat landing ghats improved under this project. The Mission found that project implementation pace is on track and expressed satisfaction over the quality of The Mission also expressed its appreciation about the successful presentation of the women market sections, and the strengthening of local governance through coaching of 105 pilot Union Parishads.

The major items of works in the project include rehabilitation of 5500 Km of Upazila and Union roads, rehabilitation of 5000 m of bridges/culverts on upazila and union roads and rehabilitation of 21 flood refuge/cyclone shelters and 30 km flood protection works.

and German Development Cooperation (KfW and GTZ) reviewed the overall progress of the Second Rural Infrastructure Improvement Project (RIIP-II) from 23 September to 5 October, 2008.

Headed by Mr. Arun Kumar Saha, Project Implementation Officer, ADB, Dhaka, other members of the Mission were Mr. Christoph Isenmann, Director, Mr. Habibur Rahman, Senior Programme Manager, both are attached with KfW Dhaka and Ms. Stefanie Halfmann, Implementation Officer, GTZ Office, Dhaka. During their stay, the Mission members visited upazila roads, union roads, village roads, markets, UPCs and on-going UP coaching under TC in Rangpur, Lalmonirhat, Nilphamari and Dinajpur districts.

During the visit, the Mission held meetings with market traders and other stakeholders, Market Management Committees (MMC), UP representatives for their roles towards poverty reduction. The Mission also observed the TC training course on Gender and Development for LGED Officials at Lalmonirhat.

The Project Review Mission also had a meeting with the Chief Engineer of LGED, Mr. Md. Nurul Islam, Additional Chief Engineer (Implementation) Mr. Md. Wahidur Rahman and Additional Chief Engineer

(Maintenance) Mr. Mohammad Lokman Hakim. They discussed matters relating to project activities. The Mission also held discussions with project implementation officials, namely Syed Mahbubur Rahman, Project Director, Dr. Cornelia L. Kuhnle, Principal Adviser/TC Team Leader, Mr. Jan Bergdahl, Team Leader, DSM Consultant and Mr. A.M.M. Khairul Bashar, Team Leader, IS Consultant, RIIP-II.

The wrap-up meeting was held on 5 October, 2008 under the chairmanship of Shaikh Khurshed Alam, Secretary, Local Government Division, Ministry of LGRD&C participated by several Steering Committee members, all Mission members, LGED Chief Engineer and other high officials.

The Mission witnessed enthusiasm, commitment and determination amongst the implementing staff, consultants and project beneficiaries. The Mission expressed conviction that through proactive action and appropriate timely measures from LGED and the consultants the project will be able to make its headway.

Joint Review Mission Visited Second Small Scale Water Resources Development Sector Project: A joint loan review mission of Asian Development Bank (ADB) and the Embassy of the Netherlands, Dhaka reviewed the overall progress of the implementation of Second Small Scale Water Resources Development Sector Project from 17 November to 27 November 2008. The Mission visited five subprojects in Jessore, Khulna, Narail and Faridpur districts, discussed and exchanged views with the community people in the field and interacted closely with the Project employees and the Government officials of the Executing Agency. progress, status of contract awards and disbursements, time extension for project completion, GON grant fund utilization, status of last action plan and new agreed time bound action plan and so on.

The Mission observed with satisfaction the improvement in physical progress since the last review mission. The Mission recommended that LGED should take necessary measures to expedite payments to LCS groups, that special effort be made to issue pending work orders for civil works for structures construction and to resolve all outstanding land acquisition problems and expedite all outstanding land payments to affected land owners. The Mission further recommended that LGED should take all necessary measures to fully utilize the upcoming dry season to complete 290 subprojects by 31 December 2009 to allow joint O&M works before they are handed over to the WMCAs. Later, on 27 November a wrap-up meeting was held with Mr. Mizanur Rahman, Joint Secretary, Local Government Division, Ministry of Local Government, Rural Development and Co-operatives in the Chair and the draft Aide-Memoire was finalized incorporating therein the comments of the participants.

Consultation Mission on Participatory Small Scale Water Resources Project: The Government of Bangladesh has applied for a sector loan from the Asian Development Bank, grant cofinancing from the Government of the Netherlands and loan financing from the International Fund for Agricultural Development, for the implementation of the Participatory Small Scale Water Resources Project (PS\$WRP). A Consultation Mission visited Dhaka on 23 November to review further progress of Project details following fact-finding Mission and to support loan processing. The Mission held meetings with key persons of LGED, Department of Cooperatives, and Bangladesh Water Partnership, and the co-financing partners from the Embassy of the Netherlands. The Mission focused on the issues on progress of Development Project Proforma (DPP), preparatory actions for establishing Project Implementation office, institutional strengthening of department of cooperatives, social safeguards-involuntary resettlement, advance action for recruitment of consultants and system performance enhancement and mobilizing potential of WMCAs and so on.



Govt. keen to improve livelihood of women workers under RERMP


Adviser for Local Government, Rural Development and Cooperatives Mr. Md. Anwarul Iqbal visited Rangpur and Panchagarh districts on 2 December 2008 to see for himself the progress of Rural Employment & Road Maintenance Programme (RERMP) being implemented by Local Government Engineering Department (LGED). During his visit the Adviser showed keen interest in inspecting the maintenance of Bamondighi-Harati road at Taraganj upazila of Rangpur district and enquired to know whether the distressed women employed under the project for road maintenance are getting their wages properly or not. The Adviser also had interacted with the women employees under the project at Tentulia upazila of Panchagarh district and wanted to know if the implementation of the said project has been wielding a positive impact on their livelihood. The women employees under the project expressed their deep sense of gratitude to the government for undertaking such a generous programme from the government's own fund.

RERMP began functioning from June 2008 in a bid to achieve the Millennium Development Goals (MDE) in the perspective of the Poverty Reduction Strategy Plan (PRSP) of the government. The five-year project (2008-2013) would create an employment opportunity for about 52 thousand distressed women for maintenance of roads measuring nearly 98 thousand kilometers at 4490 unions of the country at a cost of Tk.943 crore. The two-pronged objectives of the project is to maintain rural roads and to bolster income generating programmes and training.

The project proforma reveals that ten women from the each union of the country would work under this project. But for the povertyprone districts in the northern zone of Bangladesh the mode of recruitment would be different. For 342 unions of 5 districts in northern Bangladesh, 30 distressed women from each union would be employed under the project. All the women workers in RERMP would get Tk.90/- as daily wage and they would undergo necessary training courses on income generation. But only 60% of the daily wage, that is Tk.54/-, would be given to them on every working day and the rest amount of Tk.36/- would be deposited everyday in a 5year term savings account to be operated by each individual. The mandatory daily saving, it is said, would turn out to be a liquid asset of Tk.75,000/- including the interest after 5 years. On termination of the project, the women employees are expected to make the switch all by themselves to some other income generating profession and become selfsufficient with that accumulated saving.

Secretary Local Government Division visited project site of RDP-25

Mr. Shaikh Khurshid Alam paid a visit to different project sites of LGED's RDP-25 on 26 November 2008. The Secretary inspected Haibatpur Growth Centre and a newly built Union Parishad Complex in Jessore Sadar Upazila. This include an upazila road with roadside tree plantation, a growth centre with women market section, water supply connection from arsenic-free deep tube well. The Secretary was briefly apprised of the achievement of RDP-25. He held discussions with the shop owners, market users, Union Parishad Chairperson and members. The Secretary expressed his satisfaction regarding various measures taken by RDP-25 for the rural infrastructure development in Jessore Sadar Upazila.
